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INTRODUCTION

When Steve Jobs, the co-founder of Apple computers, sought an experienced executive to help grow the company, he pursued John Sculley, then the president of Pepsi-Cola. Finding Sculley hard to convince, Jobs looked Sculley in the eye and said in exasperation, "Do you want to spend the rest of your life selling sugared water, or do you want a chance to change the world?" In his biography, Scully writes that this challenge knocked the wind out of him and eventually prompted him to leave PepsiCo and join Apple Computers.

Like John Sculley, all of us have a God-given yearning to change the world, to make a difference, to accomplish something of real importance and permanence.

Two thousand years ago, Jesus issued a similar challenge to a few simple fishermen, "Follow Me, and I will make you fishers of men" (Matthew 4:19). What could possibly be more important than catching men and turning them to God and eternal life?

The purpose of this Bible study is to challenge and excite your heart, as well as begin to equip you for this all-important work—catching men for God.

So Jesus said to them again, "Peace be with you; as the Father has sent Me, I also send you." —John 20:20-21

This is the third of three booklets in the *Life Now Bible Exploration* series. Each booklet references many Bible verses. The task of looking up the verses can be lightened by using an electronic Bible such as can be found at www.bible.com or www.biblegateway.com. Or groups can study together, each person looking up a different verse and reading it aloud for the group to answer together.

Telling others your testimony (life story) is one of the most effective ways of witnessing because people are more open about themselves when you have been open about yourself. Your testimony can help break down communication barriers. Prepare a short outline of your testimony on a separate sheet of paper. Write it in three sections: (1) before you accepted Christ; (2) how you accepted Christ; (3) after you accepted Christ. Practice giving your testimony with a Christian friend. Keep it clear, concise and Christ-centered. When telling the story of your experience:

- Don't preach. Tell what Christ has done for you. Use "I," "me," "my"—not "you."
- Make it short. Three or four minutes should be enough to cover the essentials.
- Keep Christ central. Highlight what He has done.
- Use a verse or two of Scripture that helped you find Christ or summarizes what you've found.

Get together with those in your Bible study group sometime this week. Pair up and tell at least one person about the gospel. If you have had experience communicating the gospel, pair up with someone who hasn't. Pray beforehand and come back together in 30-40 minutes to thank the Lord for what He did.

Practical Suggestions

1. Make a list of the people you regularly come in contact with (friends, family, neighbors, students, co-workers, bank tellers, etc.) and pray regularly for them.
2. Become involved in campus or community activities in order to meet people, befriend them, and tell them about Christ through your words and actions.
3. Pray everyday that God will give you opportunities to witness to people and pray for creativity and boldness to use those opportunities.
4. Find ways to build your friendships with people, such as giving them small gifts or serving them in some way. Spend time with them, doing things you enjoy. Introduce them to your friends, or invite them to church activities.
5. Carry a small New Testament with you so that you can show people verses that explain the gospel.
6. Pray for unbelievers who do not receive Christ immediately and look for further opportunities to talk to them about Christ or show them His love. Pray that God would use the seed of the Word that has been sown to convince them of their need for Christ.
7. Memorize verses dealing with salvation and assurance so that you can share them even if you don't have a New Testament with you
8. Remember: the fields are ripe for harvest. God has prepared many who are ready to be saved.

Nineteenth century U.S. Senator Daniel Webster's response to the question, "What is the greatest single thought that ever occupied your mind?" was: "That one day I will have to give an account of myself to God."

Tips on Presenting the Gospel

1. Use a gospel booklet, such as Great Commission's *Do you Know for Certain*, available through contacting info@gccweb.org. Hold the booklet yourself and simply read it to the person as he looks on.
2. As you read, regularly ask questions to see if he understands and follows your explanation. Strive to be clear and to keep his interest.
3. After going through the gospel, ask if there is any reason why he would not like to receive Christ right now. If he says "No," have him pray the prayer at the end of the booklet with you. If he says "Yes," seek to discover his hesitation and to answer any questions he may have. Give him the booklet to read again on his own.
4. If he prays to receive Christ, show him verses that assure him of his salvation. Again, ask questions to make sure he understands God's assurance. Make an appointment to see him the next day or as soon as possible. Start going through this Bible study series with him. Invite him to a church social function, Sunday meeting, or other activity that would help develop a friendship.
5. Other tips:
 - a. Don't argue.
 - b. Agree where possible.
 - c. Smile!
 - d. Have good hygiene and grooming.
 - e. Properly dress for the occasion.
 - f. Remember the person's name.
 - g. Relax.
 - h. Be interested.
 - i. Give genuine and exclusive attention.
 - j. Never command.
 - k. Be gentle and soft-spoken.
 - n. Identify with the person.
 - o. Motivate by appealing to noble motives.
 - p. Trust in God

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X. FOLLOWING OUR LORD

What if today, in the 20th century, someone were to live a life just like Jesus Christ? What would he be like? Would he be rich or poor? Would he be a celebrity or a social outcast? Would he be consulted by the wise or considered insane? Would he be respected as a clergyman or despised as a cult leader? Would the world acclaim him as a liberator or execute him as a criminal? The startling fact is that it is up to you to find out. You are called by God to live a life just the same as Jesus Christ did.

MULTIPLYING LIFE

1. Why use a Bible study series?
 - a. It can help focus the attention of the student on the subject at hand.
 - b. It can bring together verses and information not otherwise known by the student.
 - c. The question and answer form of study is an effective way of learning and motivating. Jesus often used this form of training.
 - d. It can be referenced later by the student.
 - e. It is transferable and a helpful tool that the student can use to help others.
2. Goals of the *Life Now Bible Exploration* series:
 - a. to win unbelievers to Christ.
 - b. to help believers grow to be like Christ.
 - c. to equip Christians by providing them a tool to win and build others.
3. Seven points for action:

Remember what Jesus said: “If you love Me, you will keep my commandments” (John 14:15).

- a. The first goal of the *Life Now Bible Exploration* series is found in *Begin in Christ*. It is to help unbelievers put their faith in Christ and gain assurance of their salvation. However *Begin in Christ* will also help those who are already Christians to lay a strong foundation for their faith and will provide them with ideas and verses to enable them to share Christ with others who don't yet know the Lord.
- b. The second goal, also found in *Begin in Christ*, is baptism—not just to know about baptism, but to be baptized!
- c. The third action point, found in *Grow in Christ*, is to begin to develop a habit of daily spending time with God, reading His word and praying.

- d. The fourth action point, found in *Mature in Christ*, Part IX Sharing the New Life, is to begin to pray for and share Christ with others
- e. The fifth action point, found in *Mature in Christ* part X is to begin to give a tithe (10%) of your income to the Lord's work as well as begin to wisely use your time.
- f. The sixth action point, found in *Mature in Christ* part XI is to join together with a body of believers who are committed to reaching their city, nation, and the world with the gospel.
- g. The last action point is the one you are now doing. It is to equip you to effectively help lead other Bible studies. The goal is for you to team up with one or two others to lead a new Bible study. However, before you attempt this, be sure that you yourself are committed to and faithful in practicing each of the previous six action points. It is important for the honor of Jesus Christ that your life is a worthy example—that you have a genuine love for the Lord Jesus and for people.

4. How to Start

Break your present Bible exploration group down into teams of at least two people who wish to lead a new study. Then begin to invite your friends and acquaintances. Most people are inwardly longing for hope, purpose and abundant life. If approached wisely and lovingly, many will want to investigate the life and claims of Jesus Christ. Consider initially inviting them to a three-week study and then move on to the other studies with those who wish to continue.

5. Leading the Study

- a. If possible, have the study in an attractive, comfortable and well-lit environment.

- f. Don't pretend to be a “know-it-all.” Don't be the big chief or teacher. Get everyone involved.

- h. Have a Bible for everyone.
- i. Be on the same physical eye level as everyone.
- j. Pray briefly before and after.
- k. Let the Spirit lead and be creative through you.
- l. Be sensitive to your partner and work together with him.
- m. Have refreshments afterwards.
- n. Love, because love builds (1 Corinthians 8:1).

a. *Prepare*: Beforehand develop one or two additional, thought-provoking questions relating to each subject area.

b. *Open with Prayer*: Ask for God's presence and wisdom. If you know that others in the group are comfortable praying out loud, call on them to pray.

- c. *Bible Study*: Go around the circle and assign a verse to each person to look up. If they are unfamiliar with the Bible, help them find the verse. Fill in the answers together as each person reads his verse aloud. Discuss any questions that arise. Ask your previously-developed, additional questions when appropriate.
- d. *Memory Verse*: When there is a verse given to memorize, have the group quote the verse in unison or have them pair off and practice it with each other or have one or two people quote it. Do it differently each week.
- e. *Summary*: Summarize the main points covered in the study. Ask, “What should our lives reflect as a result of this study?” Ask the group if anyone has an action step they would like to take as a result of the study.
- f. *Close in Prayer*: Pray, thanking the Lord for the truths you have studied. When appropriate, call on one or two others to pray as well.

Present leaders should coach new leaders as they start their studies. Arrange some regular times to get together as leaders to help and encourage each other.
